Spring Creek Prairie Audubon Center is delighted to welcome Glynnis Collins as its new director. Glynnis comes to our prairie from Champaign-Urbana, where she spent ten years on the staff Illinois' only statewide clean water advocacy organization, Prairie Rivers Network. There, she served first as a staff scientist and then for the past seven years as executive director. Her professional work in the conservation field began in California, as a scientist and permit writer at the state's water quality regulatory agency. She holds a B.S degree in Environmental and Forest Biology from the State University of New York College of Environmental Science and Forestry and an M.S. degree in Biology from the University of Southern California.

Glynnis' passion for conservation began in childhood. While growing up in western New York State, her family frequently hiked and camped, fostering an appreciation for the beauty of the natural world. At the same time, the Love Canal disaster unfolded near her home town, impressing on her how urgently we need to stand up for the natural world and for future generations.

Glynnis is delighted to join SCPAC. She believes that a healthy and robust non-profit sector is vital to the work of conservation and appreciates the opportunity to use her non-profit management enthusiasm and skills in support of tallgrass prairie conservation here in Nebraska. Citizen Science Projects Energize Youth and Adults

Our prairie bird citizen science project continued for a fourth summer. Staff and volunteers recorded numbers and locations of specific prairie birds, among them Eastern and Western Meadowlarks, Bobolink, Dickcissel, Henslow's Sparrow, and others. This information will help us gauge how our land management practices benefits these species. Thank you to volunteers John Carlini, Shari Schwartz, and Ruthie Stearns for their expert help (and for getting up before dawn!) in completing the bird surveys.

Two new citizen science projects and events were initiated this year. From late summer through the end of September, a great group of volunteers started monitoring milkweed plants in our butterfly garden for monarch butterflies and their larva. The data are reported back to the University of Minnesota's Monarch Larva Monitoring Project, which helps conserve habitat for monarchs with measurements on milkweed density. And October saw our first ever participation in THE BIG SIT, a national citizen science bird census event. The center hosted six friends and birders and counted 49 species.

Much of my management work so far has been fence repairs and installation of temporary electric fence to get the cattle moved around. The cattle graze parts of the prairie to simulate the natural and needed disturbance that bison once provided. While repairs are ongoing, stretches along the North side of Bennet Road that had been damaged in the floods this spring have been completed. Some areas have been temporarily fixed as the cattle needed to be moved to prevent pasture degradation. A father and son have volunteered to walk the perimeter fences and check for damaged or missing wires/posts and map it for work in the future.
